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#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY- SWOC ANALYSIS**

Rajeev Gandhi Government Post Graduate College, Ambikapur was established on 06 July 1960 in Kumar Palace with Degree Courses in all the three faculties – Arts, Science and Commerce and Law faculty with UG Programs started in 1973. Having completed twelve years of valuable service to higher education in the predominantly tribal area of then Madhya Pradesh, it was shifted in 1970 to its own government building and was granted the status of Post Graduate College in 1972 with Post Graduate courses in Hindi, English, History, Political Science, Sociology, Economics, Geography, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Mathematics, Commerce and Geology. The College aims to cater to the Higher Education needs of students hailing mostly from the marginalized tribal and deprived sections of the society and mould them into better citizens contributing constructively towards the achievement of national goals and cherishing the values of secularism and national harmony. The objective of the Institution is to equip learners with the quality education in such a way that they are able to cope with the challenges and demands of the contemporary global society. The guiding principle of the College is to seek for academic excellence by effectively conducting curricular and co-curricular activities, to achieve all round development of personality of the learners and to attain social and communal harmony in accordance with the cherished ideals of the Indian State.

Ever since its inception the College has striven to live up the high ideals by imbibing into students strong foundations of ethical values, moral sense and responsibility so that they can shoulder the greater challenges of life can contribute to nation building in a substantial manner. The College has been obtaining a prestigeous position in UG and PG examinations among Government Colleges affiliated to the Sarguja Vishwavidyalaya, Ambikapur, Surguja, C. G.

The Institution is also hopeful that with the initiation of the forward looking RUSA programme initiated by the Ministry of Human Resource and Development of the Government of India, it will further improve its facilities and services with the help of the UGC and the State Government in the coming years.

#### **Location of the College**

Having a hoary past, the northern tropical deciduous, tribal abundant district, SURGUJA having low literacy rate physiographical, a great table land consisting of numerous hills and plateaus which is southern extension of CHHOTA NAGPUR plateaus and northern stretch of SATPURA – MAIKAL ranges and hillocks drained by puranic rivers RENUKA and KANHAR.

Surguja is on of the northern districts of newly emerged state Chhattisgarh bifurcated from Madhya Pradesh. It extends from 22038' to 2406' north and 82038' to 84038' to 8405' east having an area of 16044'.2 sq kms. The span of the district is 158 kms from east to west. The north – south width is about 162 kms.

The district is bounded on the north by SIDHI, SONBHADRA (U.P.) and PALAMU (Jharkhand) districts, on the south by KORBA and on the east by JASHPUR district. The entire western boundary is enclosed by KOREA district.




#### RESERVATION CHART IN PERCENTAGE




### CHART SHOWING PERCENTAGE OF BOYS AND GIRLS ADMITTED IN THE LAST 4




### **FACULTY OF COMMERCE**







All the faculty members maintain daily diary. Attendance in taken at every period and monthly reviewed. Laboratory works in practical subjects are done as per proposed in the Time-Table of the College. The students are finally assessed according to the University schedule at UG level and to the College at PG level under autonomous scheme.

Presentation of seminar papers provides opportunity to the students to show their performance, to interact to the teachers and among themselves. Students are also encouraged to use power point presentation.

The different PG departments are given liberty to organize the lectures of experts/people of eminence as per the requirements of the students.

Department of English shows the films of literary works prescribed in the syllabi of M.A. English i.e. Hamlet, Tempest, Gulliver's Travels to guide and the audio CDs of poems to acquaint them with the sound effect of a particular poem. The College subscribes Research Journals which is available for both the students and faculty members.

### 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

The methods of learning evaluation are informed to the students in advance before commencement of Final University exams for UG students and Autonomous exams for PG students as well. The previous year's questions are made available to the students both in

central and department libraries of respective departments which help them to understand the scheme of evaluation and trends of questions. They are also informed about the process of exams, does and don'ts during practical and university exams. They are also warned against Use of Unfair Means and informed about the penalty for that. If there is any change in the evaluation process, it is discussed in the department and thus faculty members are made aware with the evaluation process.

There are no any evaluation reforms introduced by the University. But, the College introduced semester system in PG Programmes under Autonomous scheme in the year 2008. The internal Marks of students are shown to the students by the respective departments before being forwarded to the Autonomous Cell. The Autonomous cell conducts exams and published results through a Computer Software Examinations Management System through which the error free Result is ensured.

Each departments of the College conduct unit tests, quarterly and half yearly exams at UG level and unit tests at the end of every unit and internal Tests and seminars scheduled by the Autonomous Section of the College at PG level. The departments also give assignments and project works to the students both at UG and PG level to ensure the formative as well as summative evaluation of students. Practical classes of students are conducted as per the main Time Table by the concerned departments with sufficient exposure to the students so that they can perform well in the annual exams and semester exams.

The departments conduct Internal Assessment and provide 20% of the total credits assigned for a course, class tests, assignments and seminars. The better of the two grades out of the three class tests, performance in the seminar presentations and assignments and the percentage of attendance are considered for internal grades. Assignments are given well in advance in each semester and the timely submission is ensured by the departments. The behavioral traits, independent learning and communication skill of students are reflected in their presentations, viva voce, regular attendance and timely submission of assignments. The heads of the departments hand over Attendance and Progress Certificate of the students to the administrative section in charge of examinations. Only those students who secure 75% of attendance are eligible to appear for university examinations as well as autonomous semester exam at PG level.

Besides, the Minor/Major Research Projects are likewise assessed by the departments and recommended to potential funding agencies in government and Private Sector to obtain financial assistance to the Research Projects.

The College possesses up-to-date facilities for research like hi-speed Wi-Fi internet connectivity, computers, printers, scanners, and smart boards with LCD – projectors as well as a centralized library possessing more than Eighty Five Thousand books. The various departments running the research centers also have their own individual libraries.

The College has been hosting research projects of faculty members funded by the UGC as regular basis. A number of measures have been taken to ensure smooth progress and implementation of the projects. The detail is follows:

### Reduction of work load and permission of travel

The College is well aware of the need of the investigator or researcher involved in research work, the work load i.e. exams duty and other works except teaching is reduced and permission to travel in connection of the research is granted.

### **Preparation of Utilization Certificate and Auditing**

Principal investigators avail the full support of College administrative staff in preparation of utilization certificate, its submission and auditing of funds.

The College regularly conducts various programmes to develop research culture among faculty members and students. The Department of History conducted a National Seminar funded by the UGC, and two UGC funded National Seminars will be organized respectively by the Dept. of Sociology and Commerce Dept. by March 2014.

It runs courses like Spoken English, Tally, Basic of computer and Computer Hardware under the scheme.

to the main teaching job. Besides, all the teachers are encouraged to visit the camps of NSS, NCC and RYC held in the rural and urban areas. Visiting such camps bring awareness amongst teachers of the College. The College deputes its teachers to the special camps organized by the NSS units.

The NSS Units' camps conducts social surveys of the villages and the data collected during the camp are sent to the concerned authorities of the District administration. The College also conducts ECI Sponsored Base line and end line surveys to know the electoral attitude in the division. Such surveys are used as the basis for the award of scholarships and travel allowances. The Students Welfare Cell headed by Dr. Tripti Vishwas, Assistant Professor of Psychology also uses the data obtained through these surveys to identify needy students. Students are advised to contribute magnanimously to relieve the needy students and it promotes social justice and concern for the downtrodden. Tribal students of the neighboring colony are given tuition by the NSS volunteers of our college which also promotes social responsibility. All these activities ensure social justice and empower students from underprivileged and vulnerable sections of society.

Whenever possible, books and equipments are purchased and the existing facilities renovated. As a result of methodical updating and renovation, the institution now possesses a modern approach to learning and teaching supported by some of the best material/paraphernalia available anywhere in the country.

Yes, the College has a policy for creation and enhancement of infrastructure in order to promote a good teaching-learning environment. Afew recent initiatives are as follows:

The Institution possess a large number of spacious, well ventilated class rooms equipped with latest green- boards, and white boards, interactive boards, LCD projectors, podiums and having adequate sitting facility for learners. All the departments of science as well as those of Geography, Zoology and Computer-science, BCA, PGDCA etc. have their own fully operative Laboratories. There is a Digital Language Lab with facility for 30 multimedia channels which is suitable for study of speech and communication techniques. There is centralized Computer Lab fitted with 30 computers with internet-connectivity. All the departments of the College have their own separate Staff Rooms and Departmental Libraries. There is a well equipped Conference Room an auditorium with a sitting capacity for 500. The College campus is large and spacious and accommodates a Football Ground, a Cricket Ground, a Hockey Ground, an Indoor Gymnasium with facility for indoor table-tennis and badminton. The College has a well furnished and semi-automated library with over 85000 books. A state-financed astro-turf hockey stadium is being built in the College campus which when completed, will enable the institution to organised international level hockey matches. There is a Canteen and Bicycle and motor-cycle Stands in the Campus for the benefit of students and visitors. These amenities make the College a hub of curricular and co-curricular activities in the tribal dominated district of Surguja of Chhattisgarh.

4.1.3 Does the College provide all departments with facilities like office room, common room, separate rest rooms for women students and staff?

Yes, the institution provides facilities like office room for all the staff and common room for women students of all the departments.

The College possesses separate residential structures. There is a 100 Seater Boy's Hostel which came into existence in the years 2000 and a 50 seater Girls Hostel was inaugurated in 2003. Besides, a two-room Guest House is under construction aided by the UGC.

- The College possesses a number of recreational facilities like a large auditorium, a gymnasium-cum-Badminton, Table-tennis Court, outdoor Volleyball Court, Girl's Common Room, Reading Room, playground for Cricket, Football, and Hockey etc. The Sports Section of the College possesses a large number of sports equipments like Chess Boards, Carom Boards, Javelin, Discuss, Shot-put, Pole-Vault and Sprinting and physical-exercise Gear.
- The Hostels are at present not equipped with computer/internet facilities. However, the same may be incorporated in the Development Plans for future years.
- There is an active and operational Red-cross unit in the College which functions for medical benefit for students and residents of the catchments areas of the College. The College also has close relations with the adjoining medical institutions and Government Hospitals. The students of the NSS and NCC units of the College organize blood-donation camps on regular basis besides donating blood to the willing patients of Ambikapur whenever need arises.
- The Hostel at present are not equipped with libraries, however there is a positive intent to provide books and reading materials to the hostels such as Journals and Newspapers etc.
- There is plan to provide Broad-band internet facility to the hostels in the near future.
- The hostel inmates have access to the sports facilities of the College as the Hostels are located within the College campus itself. They can utilize the other recreational facilities available in the campus.
  - \* Administrative sanction has been asked for construction of Staff Quarters present.
  - \* Purified drinking water is made available to the staff and the students without interruption; for this, three Submersible pumps are installed in the campus and there are 03 water coolers in working condition. Power supply is backed up with the help of two generators; hence, there is no scarcity of drinking water at any moment.
  - \* Round-the clock-security is provided by a team of watch men appointed to look after every knock and corner of the institution.
  - \* Recreational facilities in hostel/s like gymnasium, yoga center, etc.-Available
  - \* Broadband connectivity / wi-fi facility in hostel/s. Still in process.

Once the fund is allocated by the concerning funding agencies, the same is transferred to the local PWD unit which duly initiates the process of construction within the government norms. The Development Committee of the College keeps a watch over the quality of the construction.

To ensure constant water supply there are three Submersible Pumps as well as a Hand Pump in the campus. There are two generator sets of sufficient KVA to ensure that the boring-pumps get constant supply of power irrespective of load-shedding.


6.2.1 Does the College have a Perspective Plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered in development of policy and strategy.

We set up a Digital English Language Lab to improve the

language proficiency of teachers of other departments and of students. The Computer Lab enhances the IT skills of students and teachers as well. Guest lectures of eminent scholars are offered to the students. The academic progresses of students are assessed through regular class tests.

- Feedback from students is collected in Questionare NAAC format.
- The department of Psychology provides Consultancy Services to the needy people.
- Legal Aid Clinic is functional in the College.
- The activities of Alumuni Assocition, Career Guidance Cell and Grivances Redressal Cell have been strengthened and formalised.
- The College runs a Canteen where Refreshment is provided at subsidised rate. The College is working to prvide separate Common Rooms for girls and boys.
- The training in Yoga is provided to the hostellers and NCC and NSS cadets during their Training Camps.
- The College runs Plantation programmes monitored by its NCC Unit, the three NSS Units, with active participation of students and faculty members every year.
- The received Grants from SECL, Bhatgaon Extension, and M.P., M.L.A. funds, Jila Panchayat and local people are being utilised by the College for its infrastructural development.
- A women Cell is functional in the College to look after the problems of the girl students.
- IOAC is functional in the College.
- Compulsory medical check-up of NCC and NSS students is performed at the time of joining the units and before every camp. For the rest of the students, the check-up is optional.
